Professor Craik teaches law at the University of New Brunswick, where his teaching and research interests are broadly in the areas of public and regulatory law, with a focus on international environmental law, domestic and comparative environmental law, natural resources law and municipal and planning law. His current research examines bi-lateral and tri-lateral environmental governance structures in North America. In addition to authoring journal articles and book chapters on topics relating to environmental matters, Professor Craik is the co-author of the second edition of *Canadian Municipal and Planning Law* (Carswell, 2004), and the co-general editor of *Public Law: Cases, Materials and Commentary* (Emond Montgomery, 2006). Professor Craik's most recent book is a monograph on the international law of environmental impact assessment due to be published in late 2007. In 2007, Professor Craik was granted a Harrison McCain Foundation Young Scholar Award. His research is also supported by research grants from Genome Atlantic and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada. Prior to his academic appointment, Professor Craik practiced environmental law and municipal law at a major Canadian law firm and is a member of the Law Society of Upper Canada (1993). Professor Craik has a doctorate (SJD) from the University of Toronto, an LLM from the University of Edinburgh, an LLB from Dalhousie Law School, and a BA (hons.) from McGill University.
