## STRENGTHENING PRINCIPLED OCEAN GOVERNANCE NETWORKS: TRANSFERRING LESSONS FROM THE CARIBBEAN TO THE WIDER OCEAN GOVERNANCE COMMUNITY

### **PROGOVNET**

**PROGOVNET** is a two-year project (2008-2010), funded by the Nippon Foundation in collaboration with Dalhousie University (Marine Affairs Program and the Marine & Environmental Law Institute), the International Ocean Institute – Canada and the University of the West Indies (Centre for Resource Management and Environmental Studies and the Caribbean Law Institute Centre)

The **Marine Affairs Program of Dalhousie University**, a PROGOVNET partner, is offering one-year Nippon Foundation-sponsored Masters level graduate scholarships in the area of ocean governance, beginning in September in 2008.

The **Master of Marine Management (MMM)** is a twelve-month, intensive, professional, non-thesis and interdisciplinary graduate program designed for graduates who want to address solutions of marine management problems with interdisciplinary synthesis and integration through teamwork in research and planning. The MMM graduate will be equipped with the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to function as a manager who is mindful of the complementary and competing multi- and inter-disciplinary interests that influence the design, implementation, and outcome of the management process in marine affairs.

The **Master of Marine Management** has been designed especially for mid-career professionals and those holding a first degree and experience in a relevant discipline when entering the program, as well as recent university graduates. The student body, approximately 20 per annum, comprises a remarkable diversity of professionals and recent graduates with many backgrounds and disciplines.

The MMM Admissions Committee will review submitted applications and establish a priority list based on academic excellence and relevance to the program goals. These criteria would ensure that student activities, especially research interests, would address governance issues and complement the longer term goals of the Strengthening Principled Ocean Governance Networks.
